#### RANDOM THOUGHTS ON THE SPECIAL CALLED 2019 GENERAL CONFERENCE

From "This Is It" Sung by Kenny Loggins You think that maybe it's over. Only if you want it to be. Are you gonna wait for your sign, your miracle? Stand up and fight. This is it. Make no mistake where you are. This is it. Your back's to the corner. This is it. Don't be a fool anymore. This is it. The waiting is over. No room to run, no way to hide. No time for wondering why. It's here, the moment is now.

This is our fork in the road.

Love's last episode.

About to decide.

- 1. In "This Is It," Kenny Loggins musically begged his father to fight for his life. In "I'll Be Around," The Spinners musically promised a love that would endure rejection. Both songs lift up the need for decision-making. The necessity of decision. Decisiveness. That is what the 2019 General Conference of The United Methodist Church is about: finally deciding a "way forward" for the church.
- 2. Around 1,000 United Methodist delegates and alternate delegates (who can replace delegates who must take temporary or permanent leave of the conference) will gather in St. Louis, MO for the 2019 General Conference. From February 23 (Saturday) until February 26 (Tuesday), delegates will be, and work, together under The Dome (located in America's Center Convention Complex). On Saturday, delegates will pray and prepare for decision making. On Sunday, delegates will officially organize themselves into General Conference, hear a report from the Commission on a Way Forward on its three plans (Connectional Conference Plan, One Church Plan, and Traditional Plan), and decide which plan would best direct The United Methodist Church into the future by ordering the church's doctrine (teaching) and discipline (governance) around human sexuality. On Monday, delegates will morph into one legislative committee to consider, amend, and approve/reject petitions ("bills" related to the accepted plan and those unrelated). And on Tuesday, delegates, as General Conference, will consider (that is, vote to amend, and then accept or reject) the petitions that were approved on Monday, discuss the future of the church, and worship the Triune God who gave birth to the Church and who sustains and leads the Church.
- 3. The 2019 General Conference involves 864 delegates from around the world. Here is the breakdown of delegates by jurisdiction:
  North Central (US) 92, Northeastern (US) 86, South Central (US) 108, Southeastern (US) 188, Western (US) 30, Africa Central 42, Congo 138, West Africa 80, Europe 40, Philippines 50, and Concordat 10.
- 4. At its best, General Conference makes its decisions through fair, democratic deliberation (what United Methodists call "Christian conferencing") that is based on the Bible -- with the Church's Tradition, reason, and Christian experience helping to interpret the Bible -- in the power of the Holy Spirit. General Conference decisions that are based on the Word of God can, and should, be understood to be a part of the rule of Jesus Christ over His Church.
- 5. A majority of United Methodist bishops favors

- the One Church Plan. Proof of that fact can be viewed at their website www.onechurchplan.org. Its homepage boasts: "One Church Plan/As supported by a majority of bishops of The United Methodist Church." (As if that fact, alone, should persuade the reader [not to mention General Conference] to support the One Church Plan.) They speak and write in favor of the One Church Plan because they think that, if the plan is approved by General Conference, it would better preserve the unity of The United Methodist Church than the Connectional Conference Plan or the Traditional Plan.
- 6. For decades, many bishops have ignored church teaching on human sexuality. They have not taught it. They have not defended it. Some of them have even taught their own opinions that went against the teaching of the church they were consecrated to lead. For decades, some bishops have not upheld the discipline of the church. When church discipline was blatantly broken (often to create a media storm), they would turn away from the violation or bend due process to favor the violators. A few bishops have presided at same-sex marriages. One retired bishop did so in the episcopal area of a resident bishop, even when the resident bishop respectfully requested the retired bishop to refrain from doing so. A clergywoman, in a same-sex marriage, was elected bishop -- as bishops presided over the election process of a Jurisdictional Conference. This misbehavior by bishops has caused dithering and division in The United Methodist Church. And now, exactly those bishops whose misbehavior has disrupted the church for decades stand up and claim that General Conference should adopt their favored One Church Plan -- for the sake of church unity. That seems hypocritical.
- 7. The Traditional Plan is the only plan among the three that maintains teaching on human sexuality that is consistent with the teaching of the Bible, of our Lord, and of His Church through the ages. That is why this pastor favors the Traditional Plan. The other plans relativize teaching on human sexuality; that is, they turn it into a matter of choice; that is, if you are a United Methodist, you get choices about what to believe about human sexuality, marriage, and ordination. That, it seems to this pastor, is a sure prescription for undermining the church's unity in a never-ending way.
- 8. The Traditional Plan also would beef up accountability processes in the church, so that United Methodists cannot break church law without consequence. It also contains a gracious-exit provision for clergy who, and congregations that, wish to withdraw from The United Methodist Church.
- 9. I believe the Traditional Plan, by the grace of

God, will pass the 2019 General Conference. If it does indeed pass, that will be but one small step -- and I do mean small -- for The United Methodist Church becoming more fully the one, holy, catholic, and apostolic Church of Jesus Christ. Much, much more difficult work will remain. But through it all, Christ will be building His Church.

#### MAKING BEADED JEWELRY 101


